


Very important reminders when dropping students off in the morning and/or picking students up at the end of the day:

Be on Time: The first bell rings at 7:25 am and the tardy bell rings at 7:30. Please do your part to help the mornings run smoothly for all students. Per the Kyrene Family Handbook, pg 21, "...Students should arrive on campus at least five minutes before the scheduled start time...", "Students who arrive late (tardy) miss important information including school-wide morning announcements and instructional goals for the day."

Be on Time: On Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, school releases at 2:30PM. Every Wednesday, school releases at 12:30PM. If you are picking up your student after school, please be on time. If there are unusual circumstances and you will be late to pick up your student, please call the office to let them know you've been delayed and when they can expect you to arrive.

No Parking Zones: Sec. 24-59. - Parking adjacent to schools. A) the city traffic engineer is hereby authorized to erect signs indicating no parking upon any street adjacent to any school property when such parking would, in his opinion, interfere with traffic or create a hazardous situation. B) When official signs are erected indication no parking upon that side of a street adjacent to any school property no person shall park a vehicle in any such designated place. Do not park on the south side of Knox Rd. This is a NO Parking Zone. Authorities have been notified.

Birthday, Other Celebrations and Nutrition Standards. (From the Family Handbook) We understand that parents and friends like to celebrate various occasions. However, balloons, cakes, candy, flowers, etc. cause many distractions and cannot be allowed on campus or on the bus. These items are disruptive in the classroom and are a safety concern on the bus. If they are delivered they will be kept in the office. This policy helps to ensure that instructional time is protected and that all students are treated equally. Classroom parties/celebrations may be held four times each year. (Policy reference JJB, Student Social Events) Schools may choose to celebrate winter break, end of school, and two additional special days agreed upon by each school individually. These celebrations are designed to be instructional and to recognize the value of religious and cultural diversity. This approach introduces students to new learning and enables them to be more understanding of other.

When planning snacks for these four classroom parties/celebrations, state law requires that no home-cooked food be distributed to students during school hours. This practice is intended to protect students from the spread of communicable disease. The aforementioned four (4) parties/celebrations that take place during the school day are exempt from the Arizona Nutrition Standards. For all other activities during the school day that include food for students, the Arizona Nutrition Standards must be followed (Policy reference JL and regulations JL-RA and JL-RB). For more detailed information on the state nutrition standards, please refer to <u>www.ade.az.gov</u>. No celebrations of individual student birthdays are to be held in classrooms, on the school campus, nor are students to hold parties for their teachers at school. Party invitations may not be distributed at school.

It has long been the tradition of Mariposa to hold school wide parties at winter break, friendship/valentine day & end of the year. Mariposa has not held a party at Halloween and instead has worked in collaboration with the PTO to allow students to wear their costumes to the Harvest Festival.

A few tips from Mariposa's Intervention Specialist, Kristi Wellbrock:



Math during the Holidays

Here are a few ways you can make math practical and fun during this holiday season!

 Read a recipe together. Discuss the cost of the ingredients and how much money you will need. Have your child measure the ingredients (discuss how to convert for a half batch). Discuss cooking times (if it starts at this time, then it will be finished at this time).

Gift Buying:

- The holiday season is full of fantastic sales whether you take advantage of these deals or not, make sure you and your child go through the sales, and calculate the cost of items using percentages and proportional thinking (ex. 50% off, or 2 for 1).
- Make a holiday budget, and assign your child the task of finding a combination
 of gifts online or in the store that maximizes the budget and yields the most
 gifts, or the most appropriate gifts.
- Have your child work on gift giving to others less fortunate. Ask them to count and sort food items, and plan how they should be delivered. Have them keep track of donations, and budget where donation money goes and how it is spent.

Gift Wrapping is a great way to work with your child on measurements, geometry and proportional thinking.

 Ask your child to measure each gift, and calculate how much wrapping paper they will need to completely cover the surface of the gift.

Games!

What better way to spend time with your family than by playing board games together? These games will not only give you quality time with your children, it will activate their math skills!

A note from Maríposa's Socíal Worker, Jenn Casey:

Mindfulness is the awareness of one's emotional, physical, and mental state, and environmental surroundings. It also involves accepting these things in a non-judgemental way. Practicing mindfulness is focusing on one's thoughts and feelings on present experiences, rather than past events or future tasks (Weiss & Hickman, 2016). Practicing mindfulness can result in reduction of behavior problems and aggression, and increased happiness and focus (Suttie, 2007).

Here is a short script that you can use to practice mindfulness at home with your student!

Bubble Blower Magic- by Mellisa Dormoy

Close your eyes and take in a very deep breath. Pretend your tummy is a balloon and as you inhale, make that balloon as big as you can. Now, exhale it all out. Let's do that again now... inhale fully and make the balloon any color you want.

Now as you do this, allow your arms and legs to get as floppy as a rag doll. Just let them get heavy and loose... all limp and relaxed. They feel so heavy it's as if you don't even want to move them because they are just so very relaxed! Just allow your body to continue relaxing while we use our imaginations to imagine something wonderful!

In your mind, pretend you are pulling, a big magical bubble blower out of your pocket. It looks like any bubble blower but this one has real magic in it. It has been small in your pocket, but as you pull it out, you realize it becomes enormous! It's a lot bigger than any bubble blower you've ever seen.

Now, in your other hand, imagine you have a big bottle of magic bubble soap. Put the blower into the thick magic bubble ble liquid.... and get it nice and wet. Now you can start to blow through the bubble blower to make your gigantic bubble. As you do this, I want you to put ANY WORRY or fear you have about anything... into that bubble... just put it all in there! Then continue blowing the bubble until you think it's big enough.

Now, as you finish watch how a very strong friendly wind comes along and carries your worry bubble far, far away... it carries it so far away that you will never have to worry about that again. It's leaving now. Watch as it goes. You can blow up as many bubbles as you need to with your magical bubble blower. Put anything in there that is bothering you and watch as the wind carries the bubbles far, far away. You can use this magic bubble blower whenever you need to... just by imagining it in your mind.



Positive Solutions For Families

We know parenting can be hard! Here is our tip of the week.

Tip #2: Plan Ahead

Try to anticipate what your child may do or need in various situations. Make sure that you plan ahead to set your child up for a successful experience. Hope for the best, but plan for the worst. Always have a back-up plan!
